A message from LWVUS President Chris Carson:

Our campaign for Making Democracy Work™ will continue to be a long, hard fight on many fronts. The League is up for the challenge.

From voting rights to clean air, health care to money in politics, the League's core issues will be at the forefront of battles in state houses and in Washington. Much of our society's greatest progress is born out of challenging times and the same can happen today as we work to create a more perfect democracy.

Here's how you can help-

- Focus on voters. With eyes turning toward key 2017 and 2018 elections, this is the
 time to think about how your League can prepare to reach as many voters as possible
 over the next 18 months. Is your League ready to launch or reboot a high school or
 new citizen voter registration effort? How can you get your next <u>VOTE411</u> voters' guide
 in front of more people? Have you reconnected with existing partners? Is your League
 prioritizing resources and time to focus on our core voter engagement activities?
- Membership not required! Whether someone is interested in writing a check,
 volunteering for an hour, connecting you to a potential new partner, or making calls to
 representatives, there are endless ways for non-members to contribute to our work in
 meaningful ways. When someone new shows interest in your League, ask how they're
 interested in helping, and go from there.

In the last guidance, we talked about Making Democracy Work® by engaging new volunteers online. While it's important not to forget how effective the internet is for recruiting new volunteers, it is ultimately in-person, meaningful experiences that keep them coming back for more. There are many opportunities to engage individuals in programs that your League is probably already running, such as:

- Voter Registration Drives at Naturalization Ceremonies
- Voter Registration Drives at High Schools and/or Technical and Occupational Schools
- Observer Corps Programs
- "Hot Topics" such as around Money and Politics or Civil Discourse

Events like voter registration drives and programs like the Observer Corps are made easier and more effective with good volunteers, and the positive experience they provide new members will help to ensure their continued devotion to the League.

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Many state Leagues have focused their advocacy on protecting voters by speaking out on proposed voting legislation. Local Leagues can reinforce this action by educating and informing their communities on voting laws.

Even if you have never run a High School or Naturalization ceremony registration drive before, the time is now! This tumultuous election has brought with it a new wave of activists who are eager to get involved in whatever way they can.
