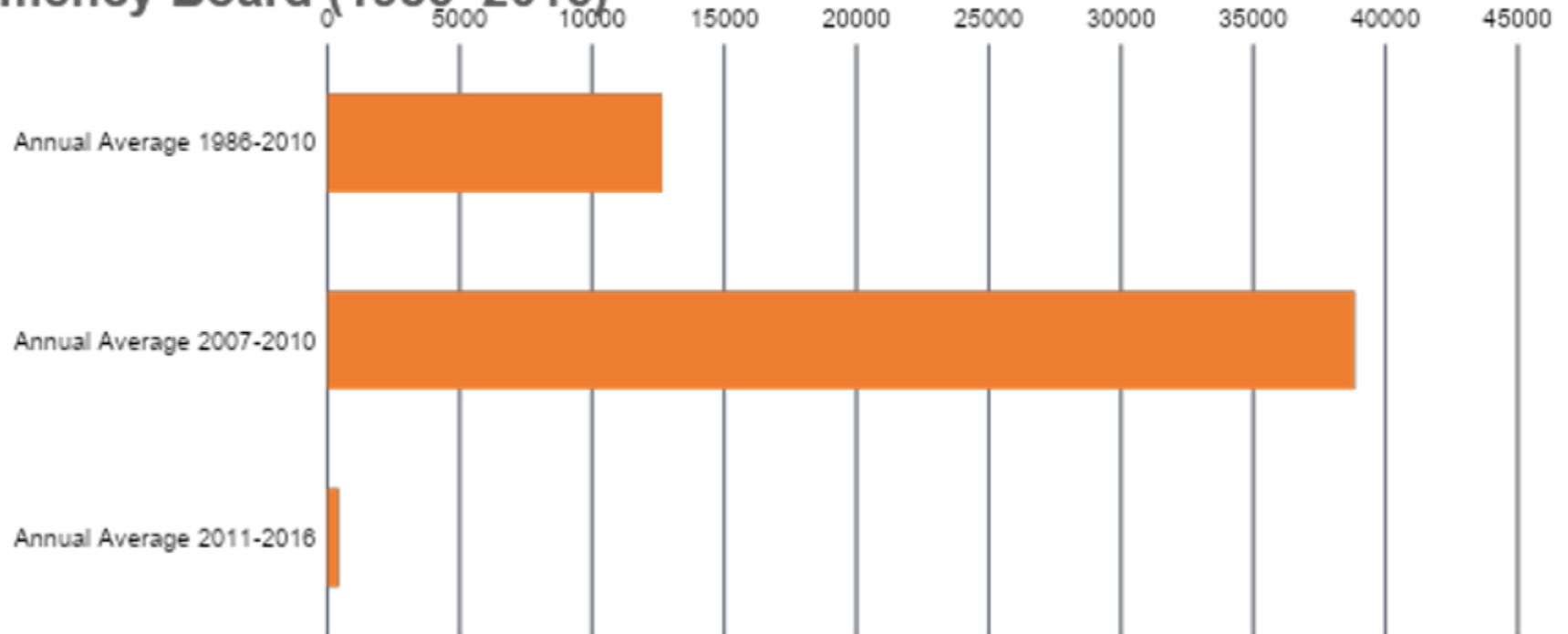
The History of the Clemency Process in Florida

- In Florida, constitutional disenfranchisement was a **direct** response to the Emancipation Proclamation.
- Intent was to make petty theft a felony and prevent African-American men from voting.

The History of the Clemency Process in Florida

- Though it originated in racism, disenfranchisement in Florida now affects Americans of all races.
- It disproportionately impacts less educated and low-income individuals.

Number of Felony Offenders Whose Rights Were Restored by the Clemency Board (1986–2016)



From 2011-2016, the annual average doesn't even reach **1,000**.

Amendment 4 Petition Gathering Efforts

- Led by:
 - Floridians for a Fair Democracy
 - League of Women Voters Florida
 - NAACP and other civic organizations
 - The Koch Brothers
 - Various churches, synagogues, and mosques throughout the state

Support was **bi-partisan**

The concept: people have paid their debt to society, and everyone deserves a second chance.

**On November 6th
Amendment 4 passed
with 64.5% of the vote.**

What does Amendment 4 do?

#1

Allows returning citizens the opportunity to earn voting rights by completing all of their sentence.

#2

Removes waiting periods imposed by previous governor.

#3

Excludes murder and felony sex offenses.

SB 7066 now requires...

SB7066 provides four different ways to vote again:

1. Pay all fines, fees, and restitution, if any, or
2. Petition court for waiver after getting written consent from victim, or
3. Petition court to convert financial obligations to community service; then complete hours, or
4. Petition court to rule no further payment is needed

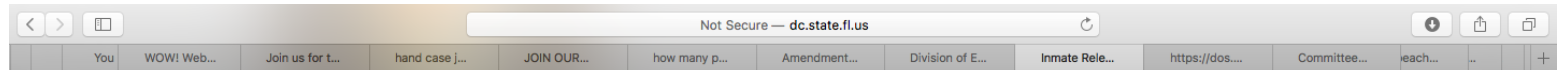
SB 7066 now requires...

- Creates a new voter registration application
 - All applicants must state whether they have ever been convicted of felony
- This requirement could have a negative impact on applications
- May lead to discriminatory treatment of returning citizens

3. Go to Clerk of Court's website for convictions.
 - Find what the sentence & final resolution were
4. Determine which **financial obligations** remain unpaid & **how much is owed**
5. Check with nearest **probation office** to see if restitution & costs were paid
