Hill days/ lobby days

Having a presence in the legislative process

Relationship building

Gathering information on what is moving



Talking points

3 to 5 short points that summarize the issue and your call to action

Help League leaders speak with one voice



Coordination with LWVUS

- Actions that can be taken at the federal level
 - Letters, op-ed, meetings with Congress, joining a coalition, taking part in a national press conference or rally, signing legal actions as a party
- Each state League is the expert on their state
 - Leagues do not communicate with Congress members from other states



Federal Action Requests

Coalition Letters

- Letter to Members of Congress, Executive • branch, Federal Agencies, etc.
- May only be sent to officials who represent your jurisdiction

Op-ed/ Letter to the Editor

- 500 to 800 words ٠
- Include a story ٠

Meetings with Federal Officials

- Advocate for legislative priorities •
- Bring talking points •
- Share intel •

State and local Leagues wishing to work on a federal issue or at the national level on an issue that has not been the subject of an LWVUS Action Alert can use this form to contact the national office to consult on the intended action.

FEDERAL ACTION REQUEST FORM

Please use this form to make requests

- 1. The proposed action and the message to be conveyed;
- a) If you are requesting to send or co-sign a letter, please attach that letter in the appropriate section of this form.
- 2. The LWVUS position on which the action is based;
- 3. The timeline for action (e.g., sending the message or deadline for signing the letter); and
- 4. Details about other groups that are involved in this effort;
- a) If the request pertains to a regional issue, or the issue affects multiple Leagues, please coordinate with those affected Leagues before completing this form (for example, if multiple Leagues would like to sign a letter addressed to a Federal official, please acquire confirmation from each affected League that they will participate and then one League may submit this form on behalf of all affected Leagues).
- 5. Evidence that the issue is a priority for that state or local League. Evidence of an existing policy position is required. If a local League is requesting permission to contact its U.S. Senator(s) on an issue that has not been the subject of an LWVUS Action Alert, it should provide evidence that the action has been authorized by its state League. Additionally, if a local League is joining a coalition letter at the state level, you must also have sign-off from your state League.



Formulating Your Action Message

- Resonate with legislators AND the public
- Who is impacted by the issue?
- Why is this action important?
- Who does the action target and why?

Talking Points

- 3 to 5 short points that summarize the issue and your call to action
- Help League leaders speak with one voice
- Prepare spokespersons for media interviews
- Resource for partners





Press Interviews

- Lean on talking points
- Prepare pivot statements
 - "What people/voters really need to know is..."
 - "What I'm really here to talk about is..."
- Mention your call to action have somewhere to send people
- Nice to have some stats or numbers to sprinkle in

Press Statements

- Respond to important developments
 - Bill introduction
 - Vote
- Block quote from League spokesperson
- Draft ahead if possible
- Send to press, add to website, share on social media



League of Women Voters Response to SCOTUS Failure to Block Texas Abortion Law

WASHINGTON & AUSTIN, TX — Last night, the US Supreme Court declined to rule on a Texas law that bans abortions after six weeks of pregnancy and allows private citizens to sue abortion providers and those who aid a person in obtaining an abortion. League of Women Voters of the United States Board President **Dr. Deborah Ann Turner** and League of Women Voters of Texas President **Grace Chimene** issued the following joint statement in response:

"By refusing to rule on Texas's near-ban on abortions, the Supreme Court allows a horrific, anti-woman law to take effect in the state. Not only does this law essentially ban abortion services, but it opens up service providers to unjust lawsuits by private citizens simply for doing their job.

"The League of Women Voters of Texas advocated strongly against this law and other attempts by the Texas legislature to roll back reproductive rights."

"Reproductive choice is not only a dire issue concerning the rights of women and all people who may become pregnant, but one of racial and economic justice. Limits on reproductive health services disproportionately impact Black, brown, and low-income communities, therefore upholding and perpetuating income inequality and white supremacy.

"Bodily autonomy is a personal right. The League of Women Voters believes every person deserves the access and the privacy to make their own reproductive choices, and we will continue the fight for reproductive justice in Texas and across the nation."

- Response/reaction
- 250 words or less
- Can be used if op-ed pitch unsuccessful












Digital Organizing

OutreachCircle


- To build out a customized ladder of engagement for supporters to deepen their engagement with LWV






For the People Act Friend bank

LMS: Reproductive Choices and the ERA

Reproductive Choices: <u>State Advocacy Strategy</u>

- Mitigating Harm
 - Counter harmful bills, ballot measures, constitutional amendments
 - Write to attorneys general
- Increasing Protection
 - Support protective bills, ballot measures, constitutional amendments
 - Advocate for protective executive orders

Midterm Update: Ballot Measures

Kansas and Kentucky

•*Rejected*: Amendment saying Constitution doesn't protect right to, or require funding for, abortion

Montana

•*Rejected*: Statute granting fetal personhood and establishing criminal penalties for providers

California

•*Passed*: Amendment protecting reproductive freedom e.g. abortion and contraceptives

Vermont


• Passed: Amendment protecting reproductive autonomy

Michigan

•Passed: Amendment establishing right to reproductive freedom e.g. abortion and contraception

Nevada •*Passed*: Equal rights amendment





Forthcoming: Ballot Measures

New York

• Equal rights amendment e.g. reproductive health care and autonomy

Pennsylvania

• Amendment saying Constitution doesn't protect right to, or require funding for, abortion



Midterm Update: Ballot Measures continued

• Arizona win

voters rejected a measure to increase voter ID requirements

- Connecticut win voters adopted an amendment to adopt in-person early voting
- Michigan win

voters adopted a measure to expand early voting, authorizing drop boxes, and allowing voters without ID

- 49 Republicans
