

Recap of 118th Congress



Congress

- Number of bills signed into law: 137
- Policy Areas:
 - Government Operations and Politics [44]
 - Armed Forces and National Security[23]
 - Economics and Public Finance[10]
 - Health[9]
 - Environmental Protection[3]



Appropriations

- 9 days until funding runs out (December 20th)
- Likely Continuing Resolutions to keep the government open over Holidays
- Disaster relief for hurricanes Milton and Helene key factor in discussions



Major LWVUS Focuses 118th Congress

- "Freedom Package"
 - John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act
 - DC Statehood
 - Native American Voting Rights Act
 - Freedom to Vote Act
- Election funding
- Equal Rights Amendment
- American Confidence in Elections (ACE) Act



Endorsed Voting Bills in 118th Congress

- Democracy Restoration Act
- Expanding the VOTE Act
- Protecting Our Democracy Act
- Youth Voting Rights Act
- DISCLOSE Act
- Early Voting Act
- Freedom from Intimidations in Elections Act



Opposed Bills in 118th Congress

- Stop Terror-Financing and Tax Penalties on American Hostages Act
 - terminate tax-exempt status of "terrorist supporting" organizations as determined unilaterally by Treasury Secretary without due process
- Equal Representation Act
 - require census to ask about citizenship status, then exclude noncitizens
- Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act
 - require citizenship documentation to cast a ballot
- American Confidence in Elections (ACE) Act
 - impose strict voter ID requirements, override DC's election policies, and allow more money in campaigns

Senate Composition Changes

- Four additional R seats = committee leadership and structure change
- Leadership elections recently completed
- Most committee assignments complete



Senate Leadership

- President Pro Tempore: (likely) Sen. Chuck Grassley (IA)
- Majority Leader: Sen. John Thune (SD)
- Party Whip: Sen. John Barrasso (WY)

- Minority Leader: Sen. Chuck Schumer (NY)
- Party Whip: Sen. Dick Durbin (IL)



House Composition Changes

- Two additional D seats, even more narrow margin of leadership
- Leadership elections recently completed
- Most committee assignments complete



House Leadership

- Speaker of the House: (most likely) Mike Johnson (LA)
- Majority Leader: Steve Scalise (LA)
- Party Whip: Tom Emmer (MN)

- Minority Leader: Hakeem Jeffries (NY)
- Party Whip: Katherine Clark (MA)





Speaker Johnson

1998: Attorney in Louisiana anti-abortion movement

2002 – 2010: Employed at Alliance Defending Freedom, Christian legal-advocacy group

ADF lawyers supported in *Dobbs* case opposing reproductive choices

2015 – 2017: Member of the Louisiana House of Representatives

2015: Founded Freedom Guard, nonprofit legal ministry

2017 – 2023: Member of US House (LA-4)

2020: Contested results of presidential election

Issue Prioritization: First 100 Days

- LWVUS to prioritize issues in a three-tiered system
 - Gold: taking the lead on an issue
 - Silver: collaborating with partner organizations
 - Bronze: tracking for awareness and amplifying other orgs' actions when possible
- 1. Democracy Education & Election Administration Support
- 2. Restore and Defend Voting Rights Protections
- 3. Abolish Electoral College
- 4. Protecting Democracy Organizations & Institutions
- 5. Reproductive Freedoms

- 1. Immigration
- 2. ERA
- 3. Defend against
 Attacks on DEI &
 the LGBTQIA+
 community

- 1. Government shutdowns
- 2. Closing the Department of Education
- 3. Broader immigration policy proposals beyond core League focus
- 4. Climate change
- 5. Gun safety
- 6. Healthcare

- Project 2025 and America First Policy Institute proposals
 - LWVUS assessment of ways these proposals could affect our work
- Defending rights
- Opportunities for bipartisanship
 - Money in politics
 - Election funding
 - Protections for election workers
- Continuing Administrative advocacy, working with agencies

Key Voting Rights legislation is not going to pass in their ideal forms in the 119th Congress
